According to a previous owner, he often asked Primrose to try his new ones. Primrose liked this viola in particular and played on it, among others, during the last several years of his life. Primrose signed it at Clark's invitation, just as Menuhin had signed one of Clark's violins that Menuhin played. The instrument is owned by collector and amateur violist Bill Thompson.

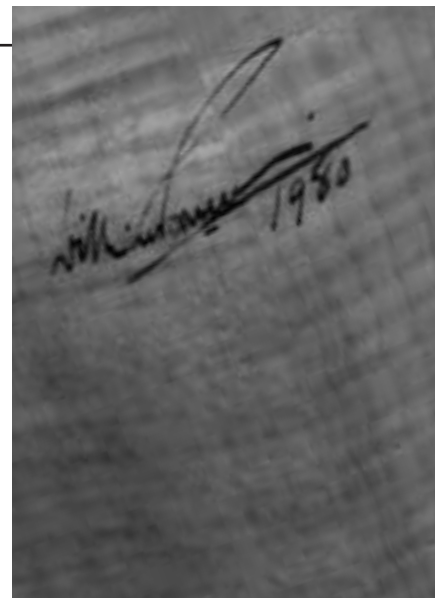
